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Historical Backround & Road Map

More than 75 years of birth of Gone with the Wind movie on December 15, 1939 (Leopold). Till now it has its own audience even some people have dislike it for some reasons such as its racist, the actor Hattie McDaniel couldn't attend the premiere because of segregation laws even she won the Oscar for her role. In addition the movie is very long 222 minutes. On the other hand, lovers of the movie likes it for many reasons such as for how it was one of the peak of Hollywood filmmaking, and how it showed modern determent, independent woman (Leopold). Two companies Produced the movie: Selznick International Pictures and Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer (MGM).

This paper will reveal some vital issues Selznick faced while filming *Gone with the Wind* movie. At the beginning, a brief biography about Selznick will be introduced. Then, based on his life history and movies nominated to awards his main achievements out of many will be mentioned (Biography.com Editors, David O. Selznick Biography). David O. Selznick Brief Biography

David O. Selznick was born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, on May 10, 1902. Selznick would later become one of Hollywood's most successful producers. In 1926 with his father's connections and ambition, Selznick traveled to Los Angeles to find a job as a script reader in one of the most famous studios, MGM. Selznick worked with MGM, Paramount and RKO. As a vice president in RKO, Selznick started to make a name for himself as a producer. He established two companies: International Pictures (1936) (which he had to sell due to taxes) and David Selznick Productions (1945). Selznick spent his time enjoying life with his second wife actress Jennifer Jones. On June 22, 1965 Selznick died of a coronary occlusion.



How the Journey of the Movie Started

while Selznick was filming *The Garden of Allah* he got a telegram from an editor encouraging him to buy the rights of a novel about the Civil war epic. Selznick read the summary and refused to purchase it due to a bad previous experience with a Civil War movie. The chairman of the company offered to support him financially so he agreed to purchase the movie rights.


The Author Margaret Mitchell

This image shows the author Margert Mitchell holding her novel (Rossi). Selznick paid the author Margaret Mitchell, \$50,000. It was the highest amount paid to an author for the original novel. In 1942, Selznick sold his company Selznick International Pictures, he felt he underpaid Mitchell and paid her another \$50,000 (Rossi).

The movie delayed for two years for two reasons (Rossi): First, Selznick determined to give the main role to Clark Gable. Second, Selznick was very selective in deciding who will be Scarlett. This resulted in over 1400 interviews for the role of Scarlett. In addition, Selznick had in mind Joan Crawford, Tallulah Bankhead, Bette Davis, Miriam Hopkins, Barbara Stanwyck, Jean Arthur, Norma Shearer, and Paulette Goddard. 
Lana Turner Tested for the Role of Scarlett O'Hara - Memo

The search for Scarlett's role took a long time. Teams spread in more than one city.

Maxwell Arnow and Charles Richards were auditioning in Los Angeles. Arnow wrote a report to Selznick about tested women. In the Memo to the left we may see Arnow's memo related to Lana Turner (The image in the top right). He found her too inexperienced (Producing Gone with the Wind, The search for Scarlett - Casting). For Selznick, he found Lana Turner "completely inadequate, too young to have a grasp of the part." (Tisdale).

Scenes Modified

In one of the war scenes, the union requested from Selznick to have at least 800 extra soldiers' bodies, so he mixed dummies with real bodies (Rossi).

National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) requested from filmmakers to remove all racial scenes. Even more, protests had gone to boycott the movie. Therefore, Selznick removed all offensive scenes and words which were against the reality of that time in his opinion (Rossi). In addition, we may see a letter (third image), Selznick received on October 1936 from Brooklyn, New York asking him not to make "a Negro-baiting film". Therefore, Selznick removed the N-word from the movie's script (Smith).

David O. Selznick Memos

Selznick wrote memos related to the movie and how he had to remove some words or related to choosing Vivien Leigh. Because of the importance of the movie, these memos were selected and edited.

Examples of these memos:

Under the code, Joe Breen is unable to give me permission to use this sentence because it contains the word "damn," a word specially forbidden by the code (Behlmer, p. 221).

P. 46: I think we can, and must, definitely lose the miscarriage. These infallible pregnancies at single contacts are a bit thick, and in any event I don't think the miscarriage gets us anywhere (Behlmer, p. 148).

Correcting on matter in teletype, i have no enthusiasm for Vivien Leigh. maybe I will have, but as yet have never even seen photograph of her. will: be seeing "fire over England.... shortly, at. which time will of course see leigh.. (Behlmer, p. 149).

Clark Gable & Rhett Butler

Author Mitchell described Rhett Butler in her novel as more dark and wicked than Clark Gable, but Selznick didn't care. Even Gary Cooper was offered to take the part of Rhett, he turned down the role (Rossi). At the same time Selznick determined to give the main role to Clark Gable.

Nearly at the end of the film Scarlett fell down the stairs after

Rhett dodged her blow. This caused Scarlett to have a miscarriage with
her baby. Gable was supposed to cry, but he was afraid for his image.

Two shots were filmed one with tears and the other without. Then he
was convinced that the one with tears wouldn't show him to be weak,
but the opposite (Oneill).

Vivien Leigh & Scarlett O'Hara

Selecting an actress for the role of Scarlett

O'Hara was not easy especially as Selznick wanted
someone with a special character. Moreover, Scarlett
was cast after filming the scene of "Burning of Atlanta"

(Oneill). While casting was going on, fans were asked to
vote for the suitable actress for the Scarlett. Vivien who
was unknown at that time, received one vote. Later and
after the movie was released she became the main star of
the film (Rossi, 2017).

Selznick for a lot of criticism because she is an English

actress. Anyway, opponents preferred her more than

Katharine Hepburn who was considered a Yankee (Oneill).

In the book, Scarlett eyes were green. While

Vivian's eyes were blue. Therefore, special effects made
leigh's blue eyes look green by wearing a lot of green
clothing and using special lightning filters (Rossi).





Clark Gable & Vivien Leigh Chemistry

Although Clark Gable was known of his affairs, both Clark and Vivien didn't socialize a lot. On the other hand, it was clear that the on-screen chemistry was obvious. At the time of filming, Vivien had a relationship with Laurence Olivier, and Gable had a relationship with Carole Lombard. Both couples got married to their lovers after the film (Anderson). Moreover, Leigh admitted in an interview "Kissing Clark Gable in Gone with the Wind was not that exciting. His dentures smelled something awful" (Rossi).



Facts

More than a million people participated in the festival of the premiere in Atlanta. The Georgia Governor announced the day of the premiere as a state holiday. Citizens celebrated wearing hoop skirts and top hats. Tickets sold at \$200 per person (in 1939 money) (Oneill). Gone with the Wind total running time was 3 hours and 45 minutes. During the 22 weeks of the filming time, Selznick rarely slept. The film cost more than \$4 million to make. It was the most ever spent on a production at that time (Biography.com Editors, David O. Selznick Biography)



Academy Award Best Actress

In this image Leigh celebrates winning the best actress Oscar with Selznick at the Academy Awards ceremony in 1940. "Selznick was the primary artistic influence on the film. He really pushed everyone," says Wilson, the exhibition curator. "His hand touched everything" (Smith).



The Movie Ten Academy Awards

In January 1938, Selznick started the production of the movie *Gone with the Wind*. The film was nominated 13 Oscars and won 10 out of them (eight competitive, two honorary) (Rossi):

The eight competitive: Best Director, Best
Picture, Best Actress, Best Adapted Screenplay,
Best Cinematography, Best Supporting Actress, Best Set
Decoration and Best Editing.

The two honorary: Special Award and Technical

Achievement Award
